Materials for a 65" x 75" Quilt

Pre-cut friendly!

- Ten assorted 1/4 yard OR ten assorted fat quarters
(Note: one layer cake, one sushi roll, four origami packs, or 20 fat eighths work too)



- 2 1/4 yard background fabric (550 snow white)



- 1 1/2 yards sashing (31805-20)



- 1/4 yard for squares (31804-70)
- 1/2 yard for binding



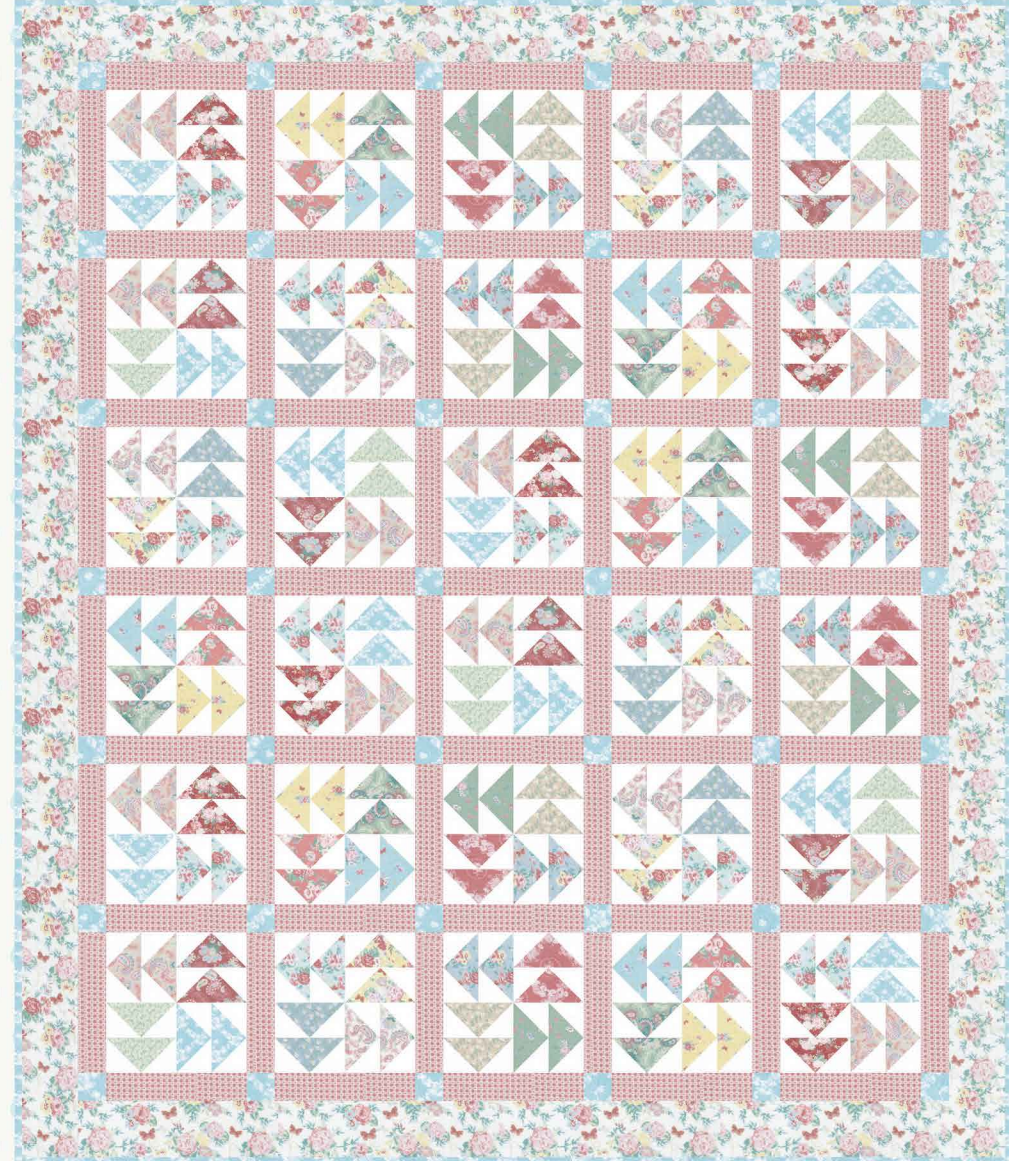
- 1 3/8 yard for border (31800-10)

- 4 yards backing

Sew using a 1/4" seam allowance unless otherwise noted. WOF = width of fabric (along the 44" length)

Cutting Instructions

1. From assorted fabrics, cut 240 2.5" x 4.5" rectangles: Start by dividing your assorted fabrics into 5 color groups (example: red, pink, green, blue and yellow). Then from each group, cut 48 4.5" x 2.5" rectangles for a total of 240. These will become the flying geese (triangles) in your quilt.

Tip: You can cut the following number of 4.5" x 2.5" rectangles from the pre-cuts listed below. Use this as a guide to determine how many rectangles you need to cut from your assorted prints.

- 1 fat quarter = 28 rectangles
- 1 fat eighth = 16 rectangles
- 1 quarter yard = 24 rectangles
- 1 10" square = 8 rectangles
- 1 5" square = 2 rectangles
- 1 jelly roll strip = 8 rectangles

2. From background fabric, cut 480 2.5" x 2.5" squares: From your 2 1/4 yards, cut thirty strips 2.5" x WOF. Sub-cut sixteen 2.5" squares from each strip for a total of 480 squares.

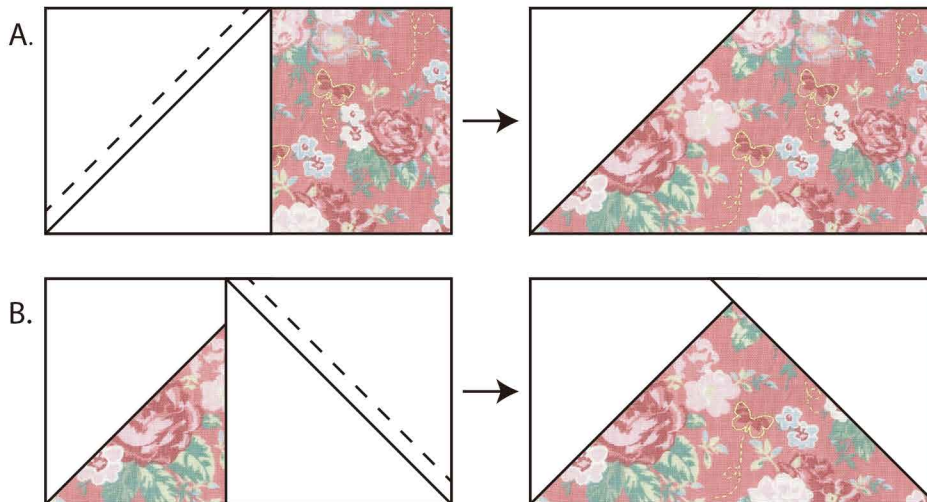
3. From sashing fabric, cut 71 2.5" x 8.5" rectangles: From your 1 1/2 yards, cut 18 strips 2.5" x WOF. Sub-cut four 2.5" x 8.5" rectangles from each strip for a total of 72 (you only need 71).

4. From your 1/4 yard of fabric that will be used for the cornerstone squares, cut three strips 2.5" x WOF. Sub-cut 16 squares from each strip for a total of 48 squares (you will only need 42).

5. From your 1 3/8 yard of border fabric, cut seven 6.5" strips x WOF.

Block Assembly Instructions

1. Assemble 240 flying geese using your assorted rectangles and background squares. Take one 2.5" x 4.5" rectangle and two 2.5" squares (background). Use the flying geese patchwork guide below:

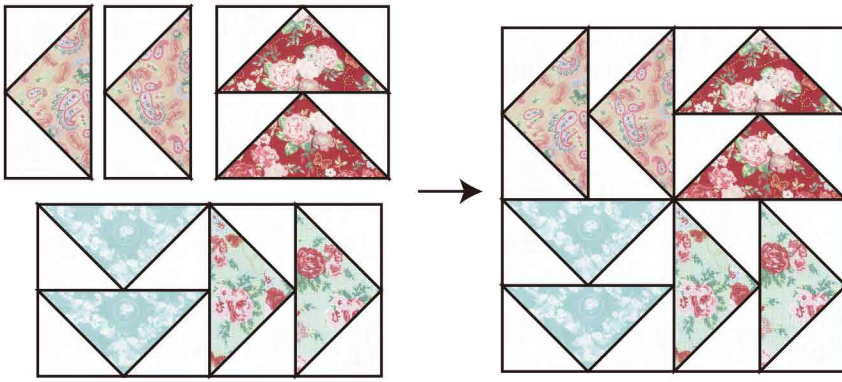


Tip: Chain piece for a quicker finish!

A. With right sides facing together, align a square on one side of the rectangle. Mark a diagonal line from corner to corner as shown by the solid line. Sew along the solid line, and then trim off the corner 1/4" from the sew line, as shown by the dashed line. Press open.

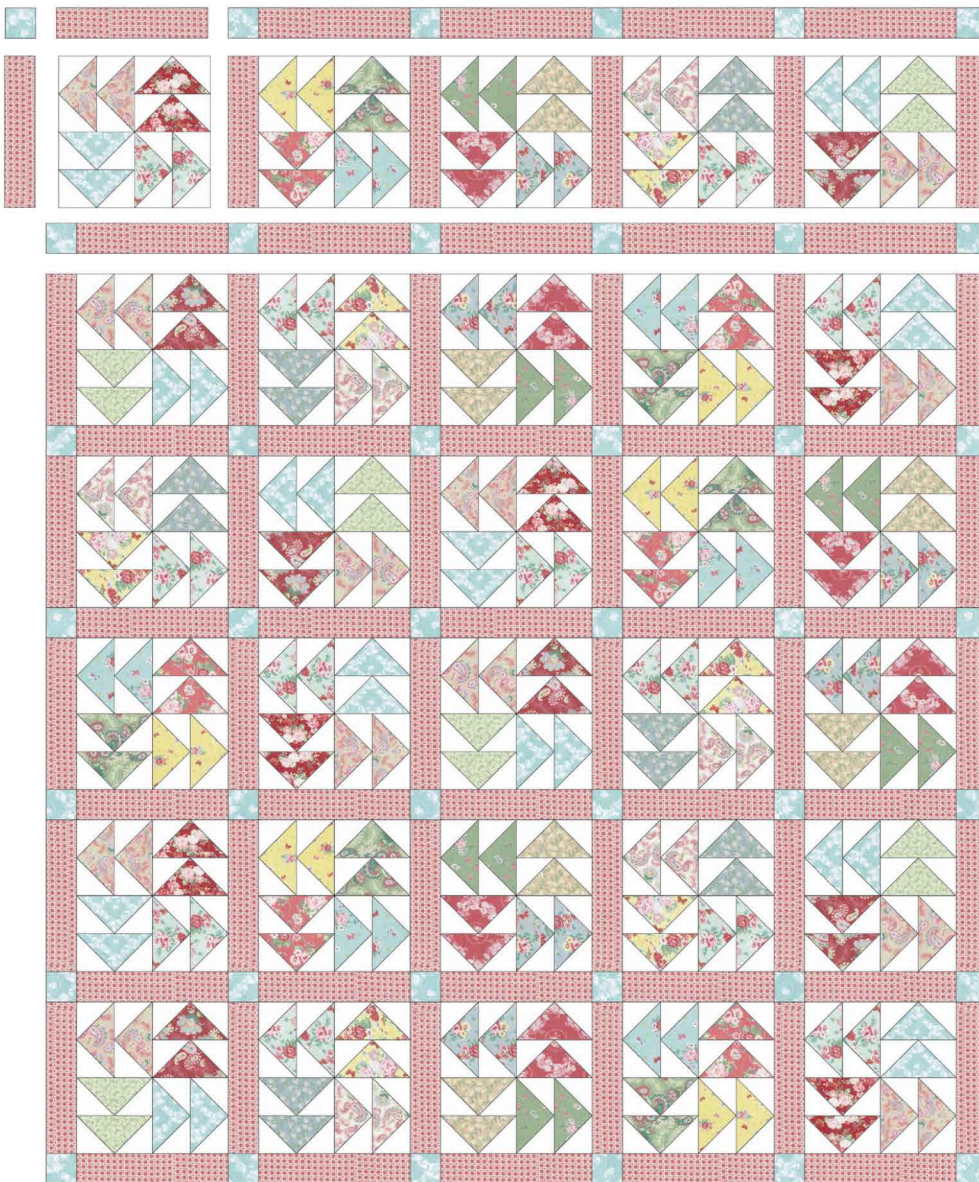
B. Repeat on the other side with another 2.5" square.

2. Next, take 8 flying geese (4 pairs) and assemble as shown below. Make a total of 30 blocks.



Quilt Assembly Instructions

1. Take your sashing rectangles, cornerstone squares and flying geese blocks and assemble the main quilt top as shown below. Start by assembling all the pieces within each row first. Then, assemble the rows together. Be sure to place pins at the seam intersections before sewing to help everything line up.



Tip: When ironing each row, press the seams in alternating directions so that the seams will later nest at the intersections when the rows are sewn together. This will help everything line up.

Example: press the seams in the first row to the left, press the seams in the 2nd row to the right, press the seams in the 3rd row to the left, etc.

2. Add the borders. You will need to sew the 6.5" x WOF border strips together to meet the quilt top's length. Start by sewing the top and bottom borders on first. Then attach the left and right borders.



Finish it!

Cut the backing fabric in half accross the width of fabric to yield two rectangles 72" x WOF. Trim the selvages and then sew together along the 72" length.

Baste the quilt, and then quilt however you please.

From your binding fabric, cut seven 2.5" strips along the WOF. Attach the strips together and bind the quilt. An easy-to-follow binding tutorial can be found on my blog, www.QuiltingintheRain.com, under "Tutorials."
